Course Description

Course Description and Credit Hours

Explores the phenomenon known as genocide by examining its relationship to the religion in both its institutional and theological frameworks.

This course explores genocide by examining its relationship to religion in both its institutional and theological frameworks, beginning with scriptural passages having genocidal intent. Both historical and contemporary examples are examined to ascertain whether there are religious components to their genocides.

Course Objectives

- 1. This course will introduce advance students to the concept of genocide and its interface with the concept of religion by examining their commonalities and their differences.
- 2. This course will examine specific incidents and examples of genocide throughout history to determine whether "religion" was a "participating factor" in those examples.
- 3. This course will finally explore what concrete and specific things can be done in both arenas to eliminate and/or address this scourge of humankind.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Students will determine whether or not there exists a relationship of significance between that which we commonly identify as religion—either or both its institutional forms and/or its intellectual/theological components—and genocide through an examination of specific readings, presentations, and discussions, viewing of documentary films, and other materials, and sharing of research papers and/or creative projects.
- 2. Students will examine specific examples of historical and contemporary genocides by critically ascertaining whether or not religion is a "participating factor" in the perpetuation of such genocides through an examination of specific readings, viewing of documentary films, and other materials, class discussions, research papers, and/or creative projects.

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- 3. Students will attempt a positive prognosis of the role of religion, both institutionally and intellectually, for both the present and the future by critically examining and discussing what various scholars have offered to resolve this issue and reflected in the Final Exam essay questions.
- 4. Students will pursue independent research either through a Research Paper of Creative Project and Improve both their research and writing skills
- 5. Student will pursue their public speaking skills by presenting both Chapter Presentations of various texts and their own Research Papers or Creative Projects.
