Introduction to the Old Testament

REL 110.001 48755

Jacobs, TR 11:00-12:15, TH 347

Introduction to the books of the Old Testament (also known as the Hebrew Bible) in their historical settings, with emphases on textual analyses, literary forms and their function and use in the past and present in both the Jewish and Christian religious traditions. **HU INB**

Introduction to the New Testament

Trost, TR 2:00-3:15, LY 132

Introduction to the ancient Hellenistic world as the social matrix in which early Christianity appeared; examines the narrative traditions about Jesus that were variously framed and organized in 1966 Gospels and the writings of Paul. **HU INB**

Buddhism

REL 209.001 48757

Ramey, TR 11:00-12:15, MA 308

Explores Buddhism in various Asian countries, Europe, and North America, with a focus on modern and contemporary periods, including: narratives, texts

& interpretations, rituals, nationalism & politics, and contemporary pop culture. **HU IBA ASST**

Judaism

REL 224.001 48758

Jacobs, TR 3:30-4:45, MA 207

Introduces Judaism and examines its history, philosophy, holiday/festival and life cycles, as well as the Holocaust and the rebirth of the state of Israel. **HU**

African Diaspora Religions

REL 226.001 48759

Newton, TR 2:00-3:15, MA 207

With case studies drawn from Hip Hop to archival finds and YouTube, this course explores the significance of Africa and religion in American culture. **HU**

Islam

REL 236.001 44139

Staff, TR 9:30-10:45, MA 308

A broad, interdisciplinary introduction to the development, practices & modern conceptions within Islam and the various ways they have been interpreted and represented. **HU INB**

Self, Society, & Religions

REL 237.001 48760

Touna, TR 12:30-1:45, MA 207

Using ancient Greek myths, the course explores the ways in which individuals and groups develop a particular sense of the self whether be it seen as religious, gendered, heroic, or individualistic.

REL Goes to the Movies

REL 310.320 48761

Crews, T 6-9:00, GP 230

One credit course with monthly films, discussions, & either the Day or Aronov Lecture. Students write brief commentaries & blog posts on the films; repeatable for up to 3 credit hours. **Open to all students.**

English Bible as Literature

REL 311.001 48762

Trost, M 3:30-5:50, MA 210

Core Writing course that critically studies the Hebrew and Christian Bible as literary and theological traditions. Stories will be examined in light of their

cultural/historical contexts, placing emphasis on the literary qualities of texts. **W**

Digital Humanities in REL

REL 315.001 48763

Altman, W 3:30-5:50, MA 210

Students will learn a variety of digital tools and apply those to data drawn from religious studies. Students do not need a background in computing or religious studies.

Religion & Identity in South Asia

REL 321.001 48764

Ramey, T 3:30-5:50, MA 210

Examines how people identify themselves/draw boundaries to distinguish groups, using South Asian case studies—such as ideas of religion, nationality, language, gender, and class. **IBA ASST**

Religion in the American South

REL 419.001 48782

Simmons, R 3:30-5:50, MA 210

Using UA as a case study, this course focuses on how notions of “the past” are invented in different ways for different social purposes, tackling analytical classifications and contestations of “the South” as an identifiable geographical and cultural space. **W**
